Nov 7 1859 – match between Pt Elliot and Goolwa

SECOND RECORDED GAME

Nov 14 1859 – match between Pt Elliot and Goolwa

The return match between the Port Elliot and Goolwa Cricket Clubs was played at Goolwa on Monday last, the result being the complete victory of the latter. This is attributed by some to having recruited to their ranks by the admission of some good hands from a distance, while the Port Elliot Club was embarrassed by the defection of some of its members. An excellent dinner was provided at Varcoe's Hotel, of which 40 or 50 gentlemen partook. The stakes played for embraced the payment of this repeat by the defeated ranks, and was consequently defrayed from the Port Elliot exchequer. The conviviality of the evening was conducted under the presidency of Mr Jones, assisted by Dr Hill. A few good speeches and some excellent songs formed the outlines of the social enjoyment. The proceedings finally closed with a ball which was conducted with much spirit.

2nd Recorded game 14 / 11/1859

Cricket. — The return match between the Goolwa and Port Elliot clubs took place on Monday, the 14th instant, and a glorious day's sport was the consequence. The Goolwa folks, having great confidence in their powers, had the hardihood to send a challenge to Port Elliot, and got a particularly good thrashing for their pains last week.

But being made of true British stuff, instead of despairing, they made up their minds to go in and win on the next opportunity. And win they did on Monday last to some tune, showing themselves off particularly as bowlers and fielders, in a style that; would not have. disggraced Seven Oaks or Lord's.

The Port Elliots went in first, and all their best wickets went down with very small figures on the score, 20 being the sum-total of their first innings. The Goolwa lads then took up their bats and knocked the ball about to the tune of 75 runs, treating the bowling of Messrs. Robinson and Phill in a very off handed sort of manner. The dead horse, left the Port Elliot bats to work out, was too much for them, and an additional 23 runs was all they could put to their account, leaving the Goolwa lads victors by 32 runs and 11 wickets.

This result had not been anticipated, the odds being rather on the other side in 7 the morning; but there were no signs of disappointment, for the Port Elliot chaps took their beating with such thorough good temper and jolly sportsman like fashion that thrashing them was far more pleasure than trouble. Another bit of a sport filled up the time till dinner, in which, as is often the case, the playing was better than in the more important event. This closed the sports in the field. The early part of the day was beautiful, but towards the afternoon the players could well have put up with a little more sun and a little less sand; but take it altogether, it was none so dusty.

About 50 gentlemen, sat down, to dinner,; which was provided by Mr. John Varcoe, whose name is quite sufficient guarantee for the quality of- the repast. There was a more than ordinary number of good singers present, which, of course, added greatly to the pleasure of the evening and the speechifying, for truth, point, and brevity, might be imitated with great advantage in higher quarters. A dance concluded the sport, and the sun got up and put an end to a long holiday, that left nothing to regret but the necessity for its termination
